

## Practice hours

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## Requirement

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You must have practised for a minimum number of hours over the three year period since your registration was last renewed or you joined the register.

Nurse

450 hours

Midwife

450 hours

Nursing associate

450 hours

Nurse and SCPHN

450 hours

Midwife and SCPHN

450 hours

Nurse and Minimum practice hours required

Midwife and SCPHN

450 hours

Nurse and Midwife and SCPHN

450 hours

Nurse and midwife (including nurse/SCPHN and midwife/SCPHN) or nursing associate and nurse

900 hours (to include 450 hours for nursing, 450 hours for midwifery, 450 hours for nursing associate)

Triple registration as a nurse, midwife and nursing associate

1,350 hours

If you haven't practised for the required number of hours, then you must successfully complete an approved <u>return</u> to <u>practice programme</u> or a <u>Test of Competence</u> before the date of your application for renewal of registration.

# Meeting the requirement

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You should make sure that your practice hours reflect your current scope of practice, but they do not have to be related to what you were originally doing when you first joined the register.

The hours that count towards this requirement are those in which you rely on your skills, knowledge and experience as a registered nurse, midwife or nursing associate. This may include providing direct care to patients but can also include managing teams, teaching others and helping to shape or run a care service.
